Pitching and Defense Lineup Card

On this side of the card you show your pitching rotation, along with your bullpen pitchers, listed in the order you'd like them to be used as starters if needed. A pitcher gets replaced when he reaches his hook number. The **hook number is equal to the number of runs** that pitcher has allowed, **plus half of the runners currently on base**. Pitchers (as are batters) are limited to playing roughly as much as they did per week during that year in the majors, making a deep bullpen very important. If you run entirely out of pitchers, we'll provide an automatic replacement, similar to calling up a weak pitcher from the minors (ERA of about 7.00!) **We used NL players for this example, but the rules are exactly the same for both the AL and NL - there is no DH in the game using stats from 1969-72.**
